### ADVISING TIPS

- Remember that the following may delay your graduation and/or may not be the best way to use your financial aid: changing majors, repeating courses instead of earning a grade of "C" or better on the first attempt, enrolling in fewer than 15 credit hours per semester, taking the wrong courses for your major or taking too many electives/fillers for full-time status.
- Always register early and pay your tuition on time! Take ACA 122, ENG 111 (or a developmental English if needed), and the math needed for your major (or a developmental math if needed) in your first semester at CFCC unless you have transfer equivalents for these courses. When you have met the prerequisite for ENG 111-Writing and Inquiry, you are free to take most of the transfer courses, which require a proficiency in reading.
- Check the location of your classes. Are they located on the Burgaw Campus, the North Campus, and/or the Wilmington Campus? The North Campus is 7 miles from the Wilmington Campus; and the Burgaw Campus is 30 miles from the Wilmington Campus.
- Obtain an associate degree! Without this degree, you have no assurance or protection under the CAA.
- Use the college resources as needed. CFCC offers scholarships for child care needs and free tutoring.
- When requesting financial aid, request the amount that you really need.

## COMPREHENSIVE ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

The statewide Comprehensive Articulation Agreement (CAA) is a legislative mandate by the North Carolina General Assembly; it was implemented in 1997 and updated February 21, 2014. This mandate is an agreement between the 58 community colleges in North Carolina and the 16 institutions in the University of North Carolina (UNC) System. The agreement is designed to ease the transfer of courses from the community colleges to the universities.

Students will transfer from the NC community colleges to the UNC institutions as juniors if the students:

- Complete an Associate in Arts or an Associate in Science degree.
- Are academically eligible to be re-admitted to the last institution attended.
- Meet the judicial requirements of the receiving institution.
- Earn a grade of “C” or better in each CAA course
- Earn an overall grade-point-average (GPA) of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale, as calculated by the community college from which they graduated (Note: If the receiving institution requires a GPA that is higher than a 2.0, students must comply with the



higher requirement. For example, East Carolina University and UNC-Wilmington require a 2.5 entering GPA.)

- Complete the admissions process of the receiving institution. (Note: The process is competitive and admission is not assured to a particular campus, program, or major. The grades of students are recalculated when students apply to a major; and oftentimes, a major may require a GPA that is higher than the entering GPA.)

**64 Credit Hours:** Students under the older version of the CAA (those enrolled in a transfer program prior to Fall of 2014), must earn 64 credit hours if they plan to graduate; they may graduate under this version as long as they have had continuous enrollment in their program.

**60 Credit Hours:** Students under the newer CAA version, implemented at CFCC in the Fall of 2014, are encouraged to complete their Associate in Arts or an Associate in Science degree and receive the maximum benefit of the CAA. A minimum of 60 credit hours is required for graduation.

## OPPORTUNITIES OF ENGAGEMENT AT CFCC

- Excel academically and enroll in our Honors classes and join the Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society; participate in play productions and musical concerts; submit your art work in a juried exhibition; showcase your art work and/or essays or poems in the Portals, a literary magazine, and receive an award for your writing; travel abroad; become a student ambassador for the college; participate in a SEX MATTERS forum; take advantage of our C-Step Program with UNC-Chapel Hill or our bilateral agreement with UNC-Wilmington; participate in StoryForce, a writing and storytelling project for student veterans.
- Participate in one of our seven (7) sports! Join one (or more) of our 29 clubs! A snapshot of club/class activities: In our Anthropology Club, students have gone to sites and conducted digs and categorized findings. Our Science Club draws students from each area of science and will help you understand our planet; and our lab classes take a variety of field trips studying ecosystems, population survivorship, animal behavior, carnivorous plants and forensic geology. Our Visual Arts Club participates in community service projects (mainly murals) every semester. Our Gallery Assistantship class teaches students the inner workings of galleries and museums, giving them an additional skill set for working in the arts. Drama students can learn costume design and make-up in addition to the play production experience.
