Why SART on Campus?

- Increases reporting on campus
- Establishes a structure for a victim-centered, coordinated & comprehensive response
- Helps create a culture that discourages victim-blaming
- Every member of the campus community is a potential first contact for victim

SART Defined

A Sexual Assault Resource Team (SART) is a multidisciplinary interagency team of individuals working collaboratively to provide services for the campus by offering a comprehensive and coordinated response to victims of sexual assault.

ODU SART

The ODU Sexual Assault & Abuse Resource Team is a culturally sensitive, evidence informed team that serves the campus community and its community partners. By providing prevention education and professional training, the ODU SART fosters a collaborative response necessary to support and advocate for students affected by sexual assault, dating/domestic violence and stalking across the gender and sexuality spectrum.

Components of SART

- Person to oversee/chair
- Information/education pamphlets available to students
- **Training in victim response and trauma informed care for campus offices**
- Representation from on and off campus partners
- Active understanding & use of policies/protocols

Benefit to Student

- Supporting victim with crisis intervention, resources, options, empowerment
- Updated policy/protocol specific to SVDVS
- Increased reporting
- Connecting students to office resources
- Coordinating PERKS and cases
- **Trained on and off campus partners**

- Relationship building with SART partners
- SVDVS policy and protocol development
- Mechanism for case review
- Institutional/leadership buy-in
- **Training faculty/staff/off campus partners**
