

ENROLLMENT & REGISTRATION

Registrations and payments should be received by APRIL 12, 2024. NO REGISTRATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED OR RESERVED OVER THE PHONE OR BY FAX! Students should complete and return registration forms indicating 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choices of classes with the proper fees (no credit cards). Do not use White Out on registration forms. Every effort will be made to place you in the class of your choice. CLASSES WITH INSUFFICIENT REGISTRATION WILL BE CANCELLED ON APRIL 15TH, so please register as soon as possible. NO REFUNDS AFTER APRIL 15TH.

NOTE: IF YOU WISH TO REGISTER FOR MORE THAN ONE CLASS, YOU MUST SUBMIT AN ADDITIONAL REGISTRATION FORM FOR EACH CLASS. THE SPACE FOR 2ND OR 3RD CHOICE IS ONLY FOR STUDENTS TO INDICATE ANOTHER CHOICE IF THEIR FIRST CHOICE IS FULL.

FEES

The fee for North Carolina residents who are members of fire departments, EMS, rescue squads, and law enforcement agencies is **\$35.00**. Remember, all fees must accompany registration forms. Only one **\$35.00** fee is required per participant, even if taking multiple classes.

Out-of-state students or those not affiliated with a NC Public Safety Agency will be required to pay **\$105.00** for classes **24** hours or less, **\$160.00** for classes **25** hours or greater. This includes the public safety college fee as well as the tuition fee. Remember, all fees must accompany registration forms.

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1403-Standard on Live Fire Training Evolutions

4.3.1* Prior to being permitted to participate in live fire training evolutions, the student shall have received training to meet the minimum job performance requirements for Fire Fighter I in NFPA 1001, Standard for Fire Fighter Professional Qualifications, related to the following subjects: (1) Safety (2) Fire behavior (3) Portable extinguishers (4) Personal protective equipment (5) Ladders (6) Fire hose, appliances, and streams (7) Overhaul (8) Water supply (9) Ventilation (10) Forcible entry and (11) Building construction

In accordance to OSHA 29 CFR 1910.134 & NFPA 1500, it is the policy of Cape Fear Community College that Students participating in live fire training may not have any facial hair, jewelry, or other impediment that will impede the seal area of an SCBA mask. Any student violating this policy will not be allowed to participate.

All turnout gear must be compliant with NFPA 1971; students will not be allowed to participate if the instructor(s) find that the gear is not NFPA compliant or otherwise poses a hazard.

FIREFIGHTER CERTIFICATION CLASSES

Sections 1-3 will present the candidate with the knowledge, skills, and ability to satisfy the requirements of NFPA 1001: Standard for Firefighter Professional Qualifications (2019 edition).

The Jones & Bartlett-Fundamentals of Fire Fighter Skills and Hazardous Materials Response, 4th Edition, (ISBN: 978-1-284-14463-5) is required for Sections 1-3.

Section 1 – FF General and Communications FIP **3040** This course includes instructional content for Orientation and Fire Service Communications.

Section 2 – FF Fireground Ops 8 FIP 3048 This course includes instructional content for Hose, Streams, & Appliances. Full turnout gear required.

Section 3 - Traffic Incident Management FIP 7000

This class is designed to build teams of well-trained responders who can work together in a coordinated manner, from the moment the first emergency call is made. First Responders learn the correct deployment of response vehicles and equipment, how to create a safe work area using traffic control devices, and techniques to speed up accident clearance.

DRIVER/OPERATOR CERTIFICATION CLASSES

Sections 4-7 will present the candidate with the knowledge, skills, and ability to satisfy the requirements of NFPA 1002: Standard for Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator Professional Qualifications (2017 edition).

The <u>IFSTA- Pumping and Aerial Apparatus Driver/Operator Handbook, 3rd Edition</u>. (ISBN: 978-0-87939-571-1) is required for Sections 4-7.

Section 4 – Driver Operator: Emergency Vehicle Driver FIP 3600 This class deals with the safe operation of emergency vehicles, driving skills, legal implications of emergency driving and departmental standard operating procedures. Saturday afternoon and Sunday class will meet outside for hands-on training, rain or shine. Please dress appropriately. Students must be 18 years of age and possess a valid NC Driver License.

Section 5 – Driver Operator: Pumps Intro/Basic Operations FIP 3623 This course includes an overview of the types of apparatus equipped with fire pumps, apparatus safety, positioning, and basic operations. This course is part of the Pumps Certification Program approved by the NC Fire and Rescue Commission.

Section 6 - Driver Operator: Pumps: Sprinklers & Standpipes/Maintenance & Testing FIP 3625 This course includes apparatus inspection. maintenance. testina. and sprinkler standpipe connections. This course is part of the Pumps Certification Program approved by the NC Fire Rescue Commission. Full Turnout Required.

Section 7 – Driver Operator: Mobile Water Supply FIP 3627 This certification-related course will discuss and detail operations regarding set up and supply operations for pump operators for mobile water supply apparatus. This course is part of the Pumps Certification Program approved by the NC Fire and Rescue Commission.

TECHNICAL RESCUER CERTIFICATION CLASSES

Section 8 – TR Fixed Ropes FIP 6503 This class in fixed rope systems will present the Technical Rescuer (TR) with the correct techniques for the setup, operation, and function of fixed rope systems used during rope rescue incidents. <u>Full Turnout Gear or attire suitable for rescue work including a helmet and gloves required.</u>

Section 9 – TR Personal Protective Equipment FIP 6508 This course in personal protective equipment (PPE) will introduce to the Technical Rescuer (TR) the need for and use of PPE to enable the rescuer to perform his/her duties in a safe and responsible manner.

Section 10 – TR Rescue Equipment FIP 6509 This class will introduce the Technical Rescuer to the operation and function of various tools and equipment commonly used in rescue operations. This course will also present procedures for care, inspection, and maintenance of personal protective equipment, tactical equipment, and apparatus. The value of periodic inspection and maintenance to reduce the chances of unexpected equipment failure, performance failure, disabling injuries, and fatalities will be discussed.

Section 11 – TR Rope Basics FIP 6510 This course in rope basics will present to the Technical Rescuer (TR) safe and effective methods of rescue in elevated and below grade environments using ropes, knots and rope-related equipment. Mechanical advantage, anchors, anchoring techniques, and stress loads will be covered.

Section 12 - TR VR Stabilization/Extrication FIP 5713 This course will present the Technical Rescuer (TR) the steps to stabilize a vehicle on four wheels, a side-resting vehicle, and a roof-resting Technical Rescuer will also vehicle. The introduced to procedures for the following: opening a jammed door using a hinge attack and a latch attack, creating a third door, total door removal, sidewall removal, working with a collapsed roof, creating the roof flap, C-B-A roof pillar cut, procedures for total roof removal, trunk tunneling, through the floor access, displacing a steering column, dash roll, removal and/or relocation of pedals, and removing and/or relocating seats. Full Turnout Gear or attire suitable for rescue work including a helmet and gloves required.

LEADERSHIP/OFFICER CERTIFICATION CLASSES

Section 13 – Fire Officer I FIP 3718 This class will cover the knowledge, skills and ability to satisfy the requirements of chapter four of NFPA 1021: Standard for Fire Officer Professional Qualifications. The class is designed to meet the needs of the first-line company officer, giving candidates the basic information needed to function within a management position. **Prerequisites:** 21 years of age, Firefighter Level II for 3 years, Instructor I certified (minimum). Textbook is the IFSTA Fire & Emergency Services Company Officer (Sixth Edition)

Section 14 – Fire Officer II FIP 3719 This class will present the Fire Officer Candidate with the knowledge, skills, and ability to satisfy the requirements of the Chapter Five of the NFPA 1021: Standard for Fire Officer Professional Qualifications. This class is designed to meet the needs of the mid-level officer/supervisor. **Prerequisites:** 21 years of age, Firefighter Level II for 5 years, Instructor I certified (Minimum), and Fire Officer I. <u>Textbook is the IFSTA Fire & Emergency Services Company Officer (Sixth Edition)</u>

Section 15 - Fire Service Instructor I FIP 3811 This course covers the knowledge, skills, and abilities needed to train others in fire service operations. Topics include planning, presenting and evaluating lesson plans, learning styles, use of media, communication, and other related topics. Upon completion, students should be able to meet the requirements of the Fire Instructor Level 1 objectives from National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1041. This is a NC Rescue Commission certification course. Prerequisites: 21 years of age. Firefighter Level II, FLSE, Rescuer or HazMat Ops certified for Textbook is IFSTA - Fire and three (3) years. Emergency Services Instructor, 9th Edition

Section 16 – Fire Service Instructor II FIP 3812 This course covers the knowledge, skills and abilities needed to train others in fire service operations. Topics include planning, presenting and evaluating lesson plans, learning styles, use of media, communication, and other related topics. Upon completion, students should be able

to meet the requirements of the Fire Instructor Level II objectives from National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1041. **Prerequisites:** Fire Instructor I certification. <u>Textbook is IFSTA - Fire and Emergency Services Instructor, 9th Edition</u>

LEADERSHIP/OFFICER CERTIFICATION CLASSES

Section 17 – Chief 101 This class will offer insight into paperwork and other issues facing today's fire departments. There will be a heavy emphasis on benefits from the State Firemen's Association, the Firemen's and Rescue Squad Workers' Pension Fund, the PSOB, Workers' Compensation and the State of North Carolina. Packets outlining the procedure to follow in case of a line-of-duty death will be provided as well. The class is designed to benefit all firefighters and is packed with useful information. Chiefs, company officers, and firefighters are encouraged to attend.

NATIONAL FIRE ACADEMY CLASSES

Section 19 – NFA Incident Safety Officer This class is designed to provide First Responders with the ability to identify and analyze safety concerns as they relate to all hazard scene evaluations, and communicate recommended solutions to the command authority. This class examines the safety officer's role at emergency response situations. A specific focus on operations within an incident command system as a safety officer is a main theme.

Section 20 – NFA Fire Investigation: First Responder This class covers the basic techniques for determining fire origin and cause, and recognizing primary clues or evidence of arson. This is a National Fire Academy class offering instruction in the proper identification of incendiary fire from the level of a first-in firefighter. Students will also learn the basic skills of managing a crime scene and the collection of various forms of evidence.

Section 21 - NFA Leadership in Supervision: Creating Environments for Professional Growth

This two-day course presents the supervisor with the basic leadership skills and tools needed to perform effectively in the fire and EMS environment. The course includes concepts related to a successful transition to supervisory and leadership roles, including concepts of adaptive leadership; change management; active followership; effective communication, including difficult conversations and advocacy-inquiry based dialogue; ethics; authority; power; decision-making; and active engagement through development of a personal plan.

Section 22 - NFA Leadership in Supervision: Perspectives in Thinking This two-day course provides the supervisor with the conceptual foundation and framework for success in leadership roles by exploring creative, analytical, political and critical thinking perspectives. The course addresses skills needed for assessing situations from multiple perspectives, making critical decisions, fostering creativity and innovation, and using persuasion.

FIREFIGHTER BASIC SKILLS

Section 23 – Basic Firefighting. Basics to be covered include: ladders, SCBA, fire streams, hose practices, etc. Practical applications will be used extensively. Full Turnout Gear and SCBA Required. Requires Chief's signature on registration.

Section 24 – Fire Streams/Fire Hose, Nozzles & Appliances This is a hands-on class that will introduce the student to fire streams, and fire hose, nozzles & appliances. **Full Turnout Gear Required.**

OPERATIONAL & TACTICAL SKILLS

Section 25 - FLASHOVER 2.0 This class starts in the classroom discussing modern fire dynamics from the latest studies. Instructors will utilize the most current research to assist in developing basic fire attack skills. Participants will then experience this training in action by entering the flashover simulator. The simulator allows the firefighter to witness the life cycle of an unfriendly fire from ignition to flashover. Learn to recognize the conditions leading to Flashover—how it happens, how to recognize the rapidly developing fire, dense smoke, high heat, and rollover, which are all present in the simulator. Full turn-out gear with SCBA and one spare cylinder. SCBA bottles must have current hydro-test date. Participants must have completed all classes as listed in NFPA 1403. Requires signed Live Burn Competency Form.

Section 26 – The Dirty Operations of the Engine Company The class offers students the opportunity to sharpen their skills and learn new and efficient skills for the vital goal of putting water on the fire. The focus of the class will be engine company responsibilities with regard to fire control and other tactical priorities are presented and practiced. This course includes a classroom component and a hands-on portion with live fire conditions. Full turn-out gear with SCBA and one spare cylinder. SCBA bottles must have current hydrotest date. Participants must have completed all classes as listed in NFPA 1403. Requires signed Live Burn Competency Form.

Section 27– Scene Size-Up – This class is designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills to perform a scene size up. The student will learn the process of gathering and analyzing information that will influence the decisions fire officers make and actions firefighters take. This class examines size-up information and factors to consider to intelligently fighting a fire without putting firefighters at excessive and unnecessary risk.

Section 28 - Stretch, Flow, Go: The Deep Dive into Engine Operations This course will address the staffing realities of fire departments everywhere. The need for efficient Engine company operations is evident in all areas, and is now demonstrated by science. This course will bring tactics, techniques, and information for the firefighter to ensure efficient engine operations in departments of all sizes. The course will deep dive into concepts that are normally brushed over quickly in engine courses. Look forward to walking away with verv different perspective engine operations. Full Turnout Gear Required.

FIRE & LIFE SAFETY/CODE ENFORCMENT

Section 29 - Fire Prevention Inspection Level I This class is designed for the education and training of code enforcement officials who have the responsibility of inspecting existing buildings. Participants will gain understanding of the NC Fire Prevention Code and will be able to apply the Code in the inspection field. Book Required – 2018 NC Fire Code, Adopted from the 2015 International Fire Code.

Section 30 – Fire Prevention Inspection Level IIThis class is designed for the education and training of code enforcement officials who have the responsibility of inspecting existing buildings. Participants will gain understanding of the NC Fire Prevention Code and will be able to apply the Code in the inspection field. Book Required – 2018 NC Fire Code, Adopted from the 2015 International Fire Code.

Statistics and common risk factors for first responder suicide will also be discussed.

Section 34 **Explosives**, Bombings, & **Terrorism** First This class takes Emergency Responders (EMS, Fire. Law Enforcement. and basic understanding Rescue) through а explosives, the latest Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) being employed overseas and domestically. how they are being constructed, and used by terrorists against first responders and the public. What first responders n eed t o do to ensure their safety against this threat and how to integrate with bomb squads at the scene of a bombing or other terrorist The course will take the students through events. and explosive understanding. basic bomb threats, search techniques and basic safety at bomb/terrorist scenes all of which they may encounter in their jobs. It will also discuss terrorist methods, activities and the latest cases. We will discuss ways we can help stop or prevent future terrorist events in the U.S.

This course will be presented through classroom instruction and practical exercises including, indoor and outdoor IED searching, active shooter problems and live improvised explosive demonstrations.

The FAA says if you use a drone to take photos or videos other than for hobbyist purposes, you need to meet the FAA Part 107 rules. Examples would be search and rescue, damage assessment, traffic reconstruction, overwatch and commercial and residential fires. You must be a certified FAA drone pilot to fly these missions. 
